


Let's Explore!: Lunar New Year


Get To Know Your Zodiac Animal

The Chinese zodiac is not only an important legend told during the Lunar New Year holiday, it is important to general Chinese culture. There are 12 zodiac animals, or signs, each representing specific years in the 12-year cycle of the Chinese calendar. Each zodiac animal represents unique personality traits. These traits and characteristics are still used today in various ways, such as building relationships with people and understanding them in a new way. Some people might use the zodiac animal traits to see whom they would get along with and work best with, or even who they want to date.














The Lunar New Year table is set but each food needs a pail, plate or bowl! Connect the dots to complete the picture.







Lucky Foods Matching Game

In the Lunar New Year tradition, food has symbolic meanings. For example, the word for shrimp sounds like "smile" in Cantonese Chinese, so it symbolizes happiness. In this activity, you can test your memory to match Panda's delicious lucky foods and welcome good fortune in the new year!

How to Set Up:

- 1 Carefully cut out all the cards on the next two pages.
- 2 Shuffle the 16 cards thoroughly, with the plain red side facing up.
- 3 Lay the cards out on the table, keeping the plain red side facing up.

Two Ways to Play:

Level 1: Match the Lucky Food

Match the Lucky Food to the same Lucky Food. Once you make a match, take the pair out.

Level 2: Match Lucky Food to its Meaning

Match the Lucky Food to the Meaning of that Lucky Food. Once you make a match, take the pair out.

Partner Play

If you've invited someone to play with you, take turns trying to make a match. Once a player makes a match, that player gets to keep the pair of cards. Once all the cards have been matched, the round is over. The person with the most pairs at the end, wins the round. Play as many rounds as you please!

Answer Key

Orange Chicken - Prosperity

In Mandarin Chinese, the word "orange" sounds like the word "luck." Oranges symbolize luck and prosperity, while whole chicken represents togetherness.

Egg Rolls - Wealth

Egg rolls symbolize wealth because they look like gold bars.

Honey Walnut Shrimp - Happiness

Shrimp symbolize happiness because the word "shrimp" in Cantonese Chinese sounds like "smile."

Chow Mein - Longevity

Long noodles symbolize longevity, or living a long and healthy life.




















Learn Chinese Lunar New Year Phrases






